

The Environmental Group Presents:

"Remediation of Lead-Impacted Soil at the Cornhusker Army Ammunition Plant Firing Range" Thursday, March 17th

The Cornhusker Army Ammunition Plant, CHAAP, located west of Grand Island Nebraska, produced munitions from 1942 until 1973. A small arms firing range was constructed on the Site for security guards and later other law enforcement agencies to practice their marksmanship.

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, COE, performed numerous environmental assessments at the CHAAP facility and established a remediation goal for total lead of 400 mg/kg in the soil. Under the direction of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, NDEQ, U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, and the COE, Jacobson Helgoth Consultants performed extensive soil sampling and analysis to characterize lead impacts at the face of the berm and adjacent areas. The majority of the soil samples contained less than 400 mg/kg total lead and no remediation was required in those areas. Approximately 114 tons of soil did exceed 400 mg/kg total lead, but were below the hazardous waste classification threshold value of 5 mg/l of lead by the toxicity characteristic leaching procedure, TCLP. This soil was disposed of as special waste at the Grand Island landfill.

An additional 168 tons of soil contained lead levels exceeding both 400 mg/kg and 5 mg/l for lead by TCLP. This soil met criteria for classification as hazardous waste; however, this hazardous waste was recycled to a beneficial use as a commercial substitute for silica in a commercial lead-smelting operation.

After confirmation sampling indicated that soil greater then 400 mg/kg had been removed from the berm, the NDEQ issued a "No Further Action" letter for the Site. The COE then sold the land back to a local farmer for crop production. This is an example of a successful Brownfield's Project in a rural area. The project was completed within a reasonable budget and schedule while achieving cleanup goals.

Younger Members at the **Zone III Leadership Conference.**

On Friday, February 25, 2005, approximately 220 ASCE members descended upon St. Louis for the Zone III Leadership Conference. The annual conference includes the Workshop for Section & Branch Leaders, the Younger Member Council, and the Workshop for Student Chapter Leaders, and is also attended by ASCE staff and members of the Board.

Friday, the three groups met in a joint session to hear from ASCE President Bill Henry, meet each other, learn about ASCE, and discuss both infrastructure security concerns and the academic prerequisites for licensure and professional practice. A reception sponsored by the St. Louis Section followed. Saturday, the majority of the sessions were held independently by each group. Section & Branch Leaders attended breakout sessions on a variety of topics.

Younger Members shared ideas, learned about dealing with difficult people, and mentoring from excellent speakers. They also had roundtable discussions on membership retention, outreach, and starting your own business. A joint lunch included the awards presentation where the NE Section received the Outstanding Section/Branch Website Award (in the Small Section category).

E-ASCE News

House Members Object to Blending Proposal

A bipartisan group of members of the House of Representatives wrote to the EPA last week urging the agency to end consideration of a controversial policy to expand the use of "blending", where partially untreated sewage is diluted with fully treated sewage during unusually wet periods to lower the concentration of bacteria before being discharged.

The 135 Representatives, including 25 Republicans, argued that this practice would result in more pollution making its way into U.S. surface waters. Instead, the letter states that EPA should enforce current regulations under the Clean Water Act and seek more funding for the Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund, which provides loans and grants to states to finance wastewater treatment facility construction and upgrades.

A similar letter was sent to the EPA last December by a group of Senate Democrats.

February Meeting Hosted by the Geotechnical Group

Thanks to *Ed Prost* amd *Joe Waxse* for hosting a great meeting.

James Mitchell gave a very interesting presentation on his and the geotechnical community's involvement in the Apollo Space program. The slide presentation provided an informative glance at work he was involved with during the NASA Apollo moon landing and exploration



missions, including rudimentary determination of soil properties based on behavior from video and photos as well as experiments developed for later missions that actually provided in-situ testing of the engineering properties of the lunar soil.

Chuck Dowding of Northwestern University offered an optional presentation on the complex blasting and reinforcement required for the work done thus far on the monument and described the many future challenges ahead that may require altering the final shape of the monument.

Both P.E.'s and F.E.'s are encouraged to participate


The Younger Members are compiling a list of future test-takers and "experts" (licensed engineers) to be used as a help reference. A study group may also be set up, depending on interest.
