

Meal Cost: \$9.00/person

Special Parking Accomodations: Park in the A area lot immediately to the east of the building under construction. Parking Passes will be required to park in the A area lot. ASCE will need to purchase the passes in advance and we will need an accurate count of passes needed. Wayne Jensen will be there with parking passes for those who need them and RSVP their names. Car pooling is encouraged. The NE Section will provide the passes free to drivers that carpool with two or more persons in their vehicle, and both need to attend the tour and meal afterwards. You must RSVP your attendance and if you are a driver who will need a parking pass, and indicate if you will be car pooling. If you RSVP for a parking pass and do not use it or do not attend the meal, you will need to reimburse the Section for the cost of the pass.

only \$9.00. We will need to have an accurate count of parking passes, and they will be made available as you enter the lot. The Nebraska Section will pay for your parking pass if you carpool (that is have two or more people in your vehicle) and all of you will be attending the meal afterwards, you must RSVP for the meal and the pass. Since passes will need to be paid for prior to issuing, if you are a no-show, we will need to have you reimburse us for the pass if it goes unused. If you come solo, you will need to pay your own pass or park elsewhere.

# September Structural Group meeting Recap

The Structural Group hosted a joint dinner meeting in association with SEAON and the Annual Structural Conference last month at McKenna's on Thursday evening, September 17th. After enjoying some classic BBQ, the group of about 35 listened to a presentation by Mark Holland, P.E. and Chief Engineer – Paxton & Vierling Steel Company.

Mark talked about the impacts of Building Information Modeling (BIM) and his vision for its future in the steel detailing/fabrication industry. His talk resulted in questions about liability (from sharing models) and limited fees for engineers to perform the "extra" modeling related work. Mark acknowledged that these issues and other challenges exist, but indicated that inertia is behind the BIM movement and it is here to stay. He challenged the group to embrace the technology and work to resolve current and future issues.
