Future City Competition Volunteers Needed

The Nebraska Section of ASCE is looking for volunteers for the 2009-10 Future City Competition. Future City (www.futurecity.org) is a national competition whose main objective is to educate and teach middle school students about engineering. Each team (3 Students + 1 teacher) is required to have an Engineer Mentor whose role is to provide guidance and help the students understand some basic engineering skills. The presence of an engineer mentor in a team provides a unique opportunity for the students to learn more about engineering and the important role of engineers in our society. The volunteer efforts are not extensive. Mentors would meet with the students and teacher 1 to 3 times per month from October until the Regional Competition on January 16, 2010.

For this competition, students are required to create a city model using SimCity, construct a three dimensional model to scale, write an essay and give a presentation before a panel of engineer judges. The winning team along with the teacher and the engineer mentor would join teams from other regions in the Future City National Finals in Washington D.C next February.

I have been an Engineer Mentor in the past and this is an activity that would like to recommend to anyone interested in volunteering. It is just amazing to see how much the students enjoy working with an engineer and discovering the world of engineering.

There are already schools looking for Mentors, so If you are interested or know someone who may be interested, please let me know and we will connect you with the schools looking for a Mentor. Also, if you're not interested in mentoring, but may be interested in helping us organize the competition (i.e. judges, essay reviewers); we can also use your help.
